## **Thomas Cook**




Thomas Cook was born at Pease Cove, Trinity East on July 15<sup>th</sup>, 1895 to John Cook and Mary Brown. He was a fisherman before enlisting in the Royal Newfoundland Regiment on February 15<sup>th</sup>, 1915. He was killed in action December 3<sup>rd</sup>, 1917 at Cambrai, France. He was 22.

Thomas saw first action with the regiment at Gallipoli where he was wounded by shell fire and evacuated to England in January 1916. He rejoined the regiment in Belgium in September 1916. He was promoted to Lance Corporal on June 24<sup>th</sup>, 1917. Thomas was killed in action near the villages of Marcoing and Masnieres during the last days of the Battle of Cambrai. He is buried in Flesquières Hill British Cemetery.

Lance Corporal Cook was a recipient of the Military Medal which was awarded after his death for his conduct during the Battle of Cambrai: 'Action date, November 20th, 1917 - When his platoon was being checked by snipers, he went forward on his own initiative to locate them, and throughout the day set a great example by his courage, energy and determination.' - London Gazette, March 13, 1918
