#### The Story of 4 Taverner's Path by Michele DuRand

In 1911, Trinity was still a bustling town with a population of 559 that included ten merchants/shopkeepers, eight teachers, three clergymen, and two doctors. The railroad across Newfoundland was expanding and the first branch built was the 142-km (88-mile) line to Bonavista, which was completed in November 1911 and included a stop in Trinity. The station was to be built in what is now the town field, complete with a locomotive turn-around. In anticipation of the new railway, in 1910 the Reid Newfoundland Company constructed a grand railroad hotel at 4 Taverner's Path, just a stone's throw from the planned station site. Local lore blames too steep a grade for loaded railway cars or too much soot for local laundry on clotheslines. Regardless of the reason, the Trinity station was built a couple of kilometers away from the town field. As a result, the three-story building with a rooftop cupola, 2.7 m (9 foot) ceilings, a front veranda, and an area of 730 square meters (7,860 sq. ft.) was put




up for sale shortly after it was built. Heritage NL states that "its large, rectangular massing and simple details set the structure apart from either merchants' or workers' homes in the area. Together with its paired front doors, these elements indicate clearly that the building is not a residence, but was built for an accommodation use." The first owners were Captain George (b. 1858, d. 1928) and Lucretia (née Oakley, b. 1857, d. 1931) Barbour, who occupied the house as their private residence. This well-known sealing Captain, originally from Newtown, Bonavista Bay, took part in the rescue effort during the Great Sealing Disaster of 1914.

In his will, Captain Barbour left the south side of the building to his oldest son Captain Stanley George Barbour (b. 1883, d. 1950) where he lived with his wife Emmaline (née Burt). He left the north side to his son Percival (Skipper Perc) Gordon Barbour (b. 1886, d. 1948) who lived there with his wife Florence (née Grant). Florence (known as Floss) authored the delightful book *Memories of Life on the Labrador and in Newfoundland* (1973) in which she recounts adventures of her interesting life, including her time in pre-Confederation Trinity.

The next occupants of the south side of the building were Vera (b. ~1922, daughter of Stanley Barbour) and her husband Henry Chaulk, who was a teacher in Trinity. The north side was sold to Archibald and Clara Clarke (circa 1950) and later inhabited by their son Llewelyn Clarke.

Major changes came when Cyril Hiscock purchased the entire building in 1972 and undertook substantial renovations, including removing the entire third floor and one of the two front staircases from the entryway to the second floor and painting the previously green building grey. Removing the third floor involved a complex process of taking down all the walls, supporting the roof with posts, and then lowering the roof slowly over the course of about a week. Cyril renovated the first floor on the north side to accommodate a bar and lounge that opened for business in 1973, first run by Cyril's son Harvey and his wife Ruth. Bernice Ivany rented space on the second floor to operate a beauty salon. Cyril and his wife Caroline (Carrie) renovated the first floor on the south side in 1974 and moved the general store 1 they had operated from 5 Gallivan's Lane; they lived in an apartment on the second floor. They also



moved an existing carpentry shop from north of the house and attached it to the south side of the building. They named the property The Village Inn, intending to operate it as an Inn, but the province would not allow rooms for rent above a general store. Photo credit: Harvey Hiscock.

In 1976, Jennifer Perry and Dudley Cox purchased the building, which they owned for three years. They renovated the house and Jennifer managed it as an Inn, with five rooms to rent and breakfast (as a separate charge), as well as a takeout restaurant and bar on the main floor. The bar opened at 10 am and workers from the shipyard and others would be there at lunchtime. One attraction at the bar was the coin-operated pool table, which was always busy and generated enough income to

pay the light bill for the entire building. They welcomed the first guests to the Village Inn in the summer of 1976. Their relatively brief ownership of the property was not without drama as they nearly lost the roof during a November storm.

In 1979, Christine and Peter Beamish bought the Inn and undertook renovations, including adding bathrooms and building a smaller third floor that added two ensuite rooms. They expanded the meals offered at the restaurant and soon were open to the general public. Peter ran Trinity's first whale watching boat tour company and was also involved in whale net entanglement rescues. They operated the bar for a while but closed after a few years, freeing up a first floor lounge area for use by guests at the Inn. Many visitors to Trinity today have fond memories of staying at the Village Inn, eating at the restaurant (featured in *Canadian Living* in 2005), and enjoying boat tours to encounter whales. Once the Village Inn ceased operation, the building remained vacant for several years while it was listed for sale.

Charmed by Trinity during previous visits, current owners Michele DuRand and Paul Snelgrove purchased the property in 2015 and obtained Registered Heritage Structure status from Heritage NL. For two scientists trained in oceanography, taking on a project of this scale was quite a gamble. After a lengthy planning process with an architect to upgrade the property and adhere to provincial regulations for renovating accommodations, work started in July 2017. Over the course of the next year, local heritage builders Sweet Lumber Enterprises extensively renovated both the exterior and interior. The property



opened under the name Rosewood Suites in July of 2018. Michele and Paul opted for a design that gave guests room to spread out and relax and do some light cooking. They therefore designed each of the nine unique suites in Rosewood with kitchenettes and ensuite bathrooms, as well as separate living rooms in most units. 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

Trinity Historical Society Inc. is now accepting resumes from high school and post-secondary students for positions at the historic sites in Trinity for the 2024 summer season

Criteria for student positions varies depending on the available grants.

All applicants must:

- be between the ages of 15-30;

- be legally entitled to work in the province and Canada;

- be a Canadian citizen, permanent resident or have refugee status in Canada; - not hold another job of 30 or more hours per week during the employment period.

Some grant programs will also require applicants to:

- be enrolled in high school (Level I, II or III) or a post-secondary institution in the 2023-2024 school calendar year; and

- be intending to return to school full-time in September 2024; or

- be graduating from Level III in June 2024 and planning to pursue an education at a post-secondary institution in September 2024.

In this edition of our Newsletter, we present the story of the fifth of the men who are remembered on the War Monument in Trinity East.



# William Jones



William Jones, the son of John Jones and Jane Penney, was born at Trinity East on March 25<sup>th</sup>, 1891. William joined the Royal Navy Reserve and reported for duty onboard the Newfoundland Reserve training ship HMS Calypso in St. John's on February 16<sup>th</sup>, 1915. He was reported to have drowned accidentally on December 9<sup>th</sup>, 1915 while serving onboard His Majesty's Trawler Returno. He was 24.

William traveled to Halifax onboard the Stephano before embarking for England on the liner Orduna. After further training, he was assigned to HMS Attentive, a base responsible for the Dover Patrol. Dover Patrol was a naval unit charged with protecting ships using the English Channel from mines, Uboats, and German patrol boats. William's body was never recovered. He is remembered on the Beaumont-Hamel Memorial at Beaumont-Hamel, France.
