Benjamin Miller



Benjamin Miller, the son of Robert Miller and Deborah Hiscock, was born at Salmon Cove on April 7th, 1897. He enlisted in the Royal Newfoundland Regiment as one of the First 500 on September 8th, 1914. He was killed in action on October 9th, 1917. He was 20.

Benjamin saw first action with the regiment at Gallipoli where he was wounded. He rejoined the Regiment in France in April 1916 and was one of the 68 who answered the roll call the day after Beaumont-Hamel. He was wounded again at Gueudecourt on October 12th, 1916 and was invalided to England. He rejoined the Regiment in June 1917 and was promoted to Corporal. He was killed near Broenbeek, Belgium. He has no known grave and is remembered on the Beaumont-Hamel Memorial, Beaumont-Hamel, France.
