In this edition of our Newsletter, we present the story of the fifth of the men who are remembered on the War Monument in Port Rexton.

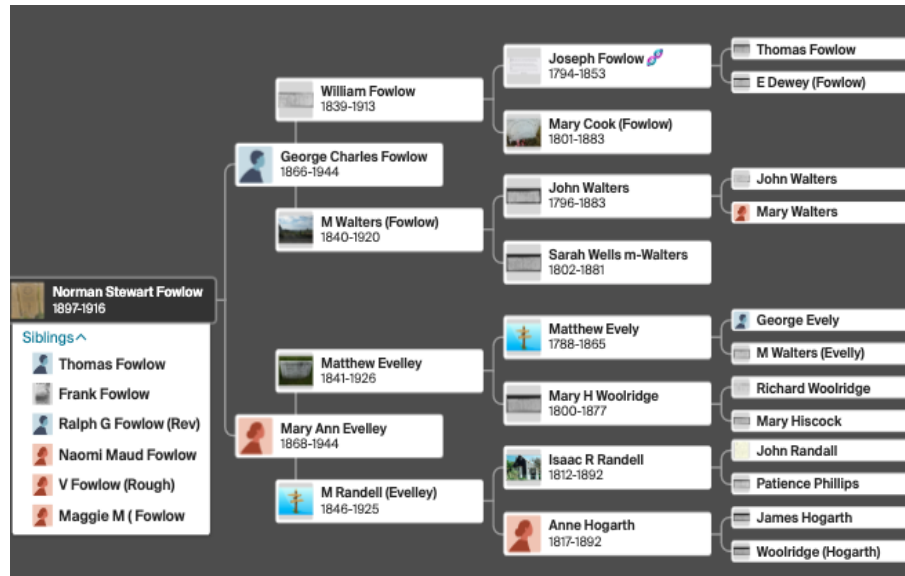

Norman Fowlow



Norman, the son of George Fowlow and Mary Ann Evelley, was born in Trinity East on January 13th, 1897. He enlisted in the 2nd Pioneer Battalion of the Canadian Expeditionary Force at Sydney Mines, NS on February 16th, 1915. He was killed on April 9th, 1916. He was 19.

Norman listed his trade at the time of his attestation as engineer. He embarked from Halifax onboard the liner SS Orduna, arriving in England on December 14th, 1916. After further training near Winchester the 2nd Pioneers embarked for France where they joined the 2nd Canadian Battalion near Ypres, Belgium, on March 10th, 1916. Norman was killed in action one month later and is buried in Lijssenthoek Military Cemetery, Belgium.
