George Hubert Miller




George Miller, the son of William Alfred Miller and Jane Morris, was born in Spaniard's Cove on November 27th, 1896. He enlisted in the Newfoundland Royal Navy Reserves on February 19th, 1915. He died in the disappearance of the SS Halifax in December, 1917. He was 21.





Family Tree

In late June 1915 George crossed the Atlantic onboard SS Glenalmond, arriving in Liverpool on July 9th after stopovers in the Azores and Gibraltar. He was assigned to naval gunnery school and in October of 1917, he joined SS Halifax. The Halifax left New York for Bordeaux, France in December of 1917. Enroute, she put into the port of San Miguel in the Portuguese Azores and departed on December 11th. She was never seen again. George was recorded as ...presumed drowned ... in the disappearance of the SS Halifax. He is remembered on the Beaumont Hamel Memorial, Beaumont Hamel, France.
