George Barbour




George Barbour, the son of Robert Barbour and Martha Ivany, was born in Port Rexton on November 22nd, 1894. He enlisted in the Newfoundland Royal Navy Reserves on February 16th, 1915. He died in the sinking of His Majesty's Trawler Rennaro on November 10th, 1918. He was 23.

George embarked for England onboard the liner Orduno and remained in England until July 1916 when he was sent to Mudros Bay, the British naval base on the Greek island of Lemnos. There he served on the drifter Paragon until March 21st, 1918 when he was transferred to the trawler Rennaro as leading seaman. George was killed on November 10th when the Rennaro was sunk by a mine explosion while clearing mines in Dardanelles Straight. His remains were never recovered. He is remembered on the Beaumont-Hamel Memorial, Beaumont-Hamel, France.
