Marcus Randell



Marcus Randell, the son of Walter Randell and Angilina Butler, was born at Port Rexton on September 29th, 1899. He enlisted in the Royal Newfoundland Regiment on May 14th, 1917. He died of wounds on October 17th, 1918. He was 19.

Marcus, after training at Ayr, Scotland, joined the Regiment near Steenvoorde in the northeast of France on February 2nd, 1918. He became ill on March 4th and after hospitalization, rejoined the Regiment on April 30th. He was fighting with the Regiment near Ledgeham, Belgium on October 16th, 1918 when he sustained a gunshot wound to the head. He died in hospital the following day. He is buried at Terlincthun British Cemetery near Boulogne, France.
