
1st Annual Loyal Trinity Volunteer Ranger Award



Note of Thanks

On Tuesday 2 August during an afternoon hike on Gun Hill in Trinity, my husband Stan Dragland had sudden cardiac arrest. Basic Gravestone Care & Conservation Do's & Don'ts

Hello readers, this is Robyn Lacy, archaeologist and co-director of Black Cat Cemetery Preservation. This spring we worked closely with the Trinity Historical Society to clean, repair, and preserve the historic gravestones at the Anglican Churchyard in the heart of Trinity. Today, I'd like to tell you all about the basic 'Do's and Don'ts' of gravestone care and conservation, for when you need to take care of your own family's gravestones! Please note that gravestone conservation is a heritage skill that requires training and more invasive procedures such as repairs should be left to the professionals. Our work often also requires an archaeological permit to work on these historic sites. Gravestone Care 'Do's'

The most important thing to remember when cleaning a gravestone is that you don't want to do anything to impact the stone. Marble, limestone, and sandstone, the most common types of stones used historically in Newfoundland, are quite soft and porous, so any cleaning product used will seep into the stone itself. If you use certain materials which we'll discuss below, it is like planting a time bomb in the gravestone; you don't know when, but eventually it will destroy the face of the stone.

You can clean most of the grime and dirt off a gravestone using only water and a soft brush. You'll want to find a soft natural or synthetic fibre brush (think soft nylon dish brush) to clean with. Spray the gravestone with water using a spray bottle, a hand-pump sprayer, or even a hose on a low-pressure stream, and gently brush the surface of the stone. Built up dirt will come off quite easily!

If the stone has moss or lichen on it, please wet it first and allow it to get nice and soft before using the brush to remove it, or a soft plastic scraper or putty knife. This should only be done if you are confident that the lichen is soft and not adhered too strongly to the surface of the gravestone. Plants, which cause 'biological weathering', eat into the calcium carbonate in the stone, looking for nutrients, and pulling off these plants can pull pieces of the stone away with it. If the lichen or moss isn't too old, it should come off, but if you notice divots or pieces of stone coming off, stop scraping immediately.

If water isn't quite enough to get some of those pesky stains, you can always try a PH-neutral, non-ionic cleaner such as D/2 Biological Solutions, which can be ordered online from several

Canadian companies. It's fairly expensive, but this type of cleaner is the only kind that is safe for use on historic stonework, gravestones and buildings alike! It does not have any acids or salts, and therefore will not deposit anything harmful into the stone. It is safe for use around plants and animals as well and is non-toxic.

Gravestone Care 'Don'ts'

There are a number of materials and techniques that used to be common for gravestone cleaning and care, that we now understand are detrimental to the survival of the stones. It's important to research everything you do to historic objects before you do it just in case it could cause damage.

Never use metal brushes or wire for gravestone cleaning. The metal will scrape the surface of the stone and cause damage that we cannot repair.

Do not use household cleaners such as dish soap, or bleach, to clean a gravestone. They damage the surface of the stone, and deposit acids and salts into the stone, which will swell and crack it from the inside. It cannot be reversed. Bleach damage to stones is especially bad!

Similarly, do not use materials like baby powder, flour, shaving cream, or similar, to try and read worn text on a gravestone. Like the cleaning products above, these materials sink into the stone, expand when wet, and will crack the stone apart from the inside. It may not happen immediately, but it will cause damage.

We do not recommend the product 'Wet and Forget'. While it is made for the removal of plants on stonework, it has not undergone the rigorous testing of D/2 and is not safe for use around plants and animals.

Do not use adhesives that are not safe for use on stone, specifically rubber cement, caulking, plaster, or concrete. These are not sympathetic with historic stonework, are difficult or impossible to remove, often fail and cause the stone more damage when it falls again, and in the case of concrete/cement products, trap moisture inside the stone and cause weak points where it will weather faster in the wind and break apart. Concrete is nearly impossible to remove from soft stone without damage, and we highly advise against it. Small cracks can be repaired with lime mortar, but make sure you use a mortar that *does not* contain Portland cement.

Pressure washers should never be used to clean a gravestone. The high pressure of the powered washers removes dirt...along with a layer of the stone itself. It looks clean for a short period of time, but without that polished exterior, the stone will weather apart faster.

Finally, please do not cover the entire gravestone in paint. This process traps moisture inside the stone, in the same way it does for brickwork walls, and causes the stone to crumble faster. It is a common practice in Newfoundland, but unfortunately one that does cause damage, so we advise against it. Photos and documentation are the best way to preserve the inscriptions. While we understand that some of these products and tools may have been used in the past, they are no longer safe for use on gravestones within the current knowledge of conservation science.


As we previously reported, a total of 127 headstones have now been restored in St. Paul's Churchyard as part of our Adopt a Headstone Project. We would like to thank Ervin Locke for the donation of two loads of crusher dust during the most recent week of work on the stones in June. We have identified another 30 headstones that require up righting and repair. The remaining stones need cleaning. We currently have \$4,197.11 remaining in the Project account and we continue to fundraise. Further work to complete this restoration will depend on our ability to raise additional funds for the project.

The book launch of "From Fisher's Cove, Trinity. Poetry and Prose by siblings Rose Sullivan and George Hoskins" at the Lester Garland House with readings by Ruth Lawrence and Des Walsh will be rescheduled but we do not have a date as yet. In this edition of our Newsletter, we present the story of the 19th of the men whose names are inscribed on the War Monument in St. Paul's Churchyard.

Mounted Rifles at Sherbrooke, Quebec on March 8, 1915. He was killed in action on November 28, 1915 near Ploegsteert, Belgium. He was 27.

Thomas was in Trinity and joined the Royal Orange Lodge here in 1912. He was admitted to Bishop's University in Lennoxville, Quebec in 1913 and received his B.A. in 1915. He was studying for his Masters of Arts in Theological Studies when he enlisted. He was promoted to Lance Corporal while in England on September 1, 1915 and arrived in France on October 24. On the night of November 28 his squadron was stationed in the trenches near Ploegsteert when he was killed by a sniper, the first death reported. He is buried at Berks Cemetery Extension, Belgium. In a letter to Bishop's University, three fellow corporals wrote:" he was a good soldier and a true friend at all times, which is the highest praise one soldier can give another."



Thomas J. Eustace



Thomas Eustace, the son of George Eustace and Caroline Weir, was born in Torbay on February 1, 1888. He enlisted in the Canadian
